Edward Taihakurei Junior Durie of Ngati Raukawa, Kauwhata, Rangitane, was educated at Te Aute College and Victoria University of Wellington, graduating BA,LLB in 1965. He worked as a barrister and solicitor in Wellington from 1965 to 1968, and in Tauranga from 1969 to 1974. He was appointed judge of the Māori Land Court in 1974, the first person of Māori ancestry to be a land court judge, and has served as Chief Judge since 1981. As judge of the Māori Land Court, Edward Durie lived in Rotorua, moving to Wellington on his appointment as Chief Judge. He has been Chair of the Waitangi Tribunal from 1981.

Chief Judge Durie is a distinguished jurist who has made a major contribution to the development of the constitution of New Zealand particularly in his work as Chair of the Waitangi Tribunal. He has expounded and nurtured a significant Treaty jurisprudence through important Reports of the Tribunal, especially during the past ten years. These Reports have been marked by their comprehensive nature, their historical sweep and their positive and original analysis. The jurisprudence to which Chief Judge Durie has made an enduring contribution lies at the heart of constitutional change for New Zealand, recognising the foundation role in New Zealand society of the Treaty of Waitangi and indicating pathways to the establishment of a bicultural partnership of integrity for the governance of the country. As Chair of the Tribunal he has been instrumental in developing a bicultural process for the hearing of Treaty claims, making an important contribution to the development of fresh forms of legal process of significance not only for New Zealand but also all common law jurisdictions. His

consistent upholding of justice, partnership and negotiation as significant values in New Zealand society, and his offering of fresh, detailed and practical proposals for the realisation of those values in social, political, cultural and economic life, have marked Edward Durie's stewardship of the Chair of the Waitangi Tribunal. His ideas have influenced other judges, and particularly the New Zealand Court of Appeal, in its approach to the reciprocal rights and duties of Treaty partnership. They have also been influential in the political process, contributing to the direct negotiation of Treaty claims in recent times.

It is this feature of his work and leadership, in particular, which has earned Chief Judge Durie his national and international reputation. He is widely regarded as a lucid, humanitarian and creative contributor to distinguished international gatherings of legal scholars and jurists on indigenous people's rights, race relations and the development of peaceful and fruitful partnership between indigenous and settler peoples. His views have been sought in Canada, the United States, South Africa, England and Japan, among others, in recent years, as well as within New Zealand.

Chief Judge Durie gained the respect and support of all the tangata whenua tribes in the University of Waikato's district in the years he lived here (1969 - 81). He lived and practised law in Tauranga for the five years immediately preceding his appointment as a judge of the Māori Land Court. The professional reputation which led to this appointment was cemented while he was part of that specific community of the University, and augmented during the eight years subsequently spent in another community of significance to the University of Waikato, Rotorua. Chief Judge Durie has, through his example and efforts, been an influential figure in legal education and Māori participation in legal education and practice.

The University of Waikato Law School, Te Piringa, born of a vision in Te Matahauariki, was established with a commitment to providing a law degree offering a multi-disciplinary approach to the study of law and to contributing to the development of a New Zealand jurisprudence that supports the principles of justice, democracy, and equality and that respects and reflects the rights and responsibilities of all peoples and cultures. Who better can I present to you, Mr Chancellor, to exemplify these high ideals, than

SILVIA ROSE CARTWRIGHT

FOR THE DEGREE OF HONORARY DOCTOR OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WAIKATO

Mr Chancellor

The highest honour a university can bestow upon any individual is its Honorary Doctorate. Today we are exceptionally fortunate to be able to honour, and therefore to be honoured by, two outstanding jurists. Their illustrious careers provide living examples of that dedication and service to the community to which we hope, on this auspicious day, our own graduating students will aspire in their professional and personal lives.

Silvia Rose Cartwright was educated at Otago Girls' High School and the University of Otago, graduating LLB in 1967. She was in private legal practice from 1968 to 1971, in Dunedin and later Rotorua, then moving to Hamilton where she was a partner in the firm of Harkness, Henry & Co for ten years, from 1971-1981. She served as a District and Family Court Judge from 1981 to 1988, and has been the Chief District Court Judge since 1989. Dame Silvia was appointed Judge of the High Court of New Zealand in June 1993, the first woman to be appointed to the High Court in New Zealand, taking up her appointment in August 1993.

Dame Silvia is a distinguished lawyer and judge who has made a significant contribution to the development of new forms and standards of accountability and good practice in public institutions in New Zealand, including universities. She conducted the Inquiry into the treatment of cervical cancer and related matters at National Women's Hospital, an inquiry which lasted over 18 months and involved many witnesses from both New Zealand and overseas. Her Report to the Minister of Health in August 1988 has had widespread ramifications for the administration of health in New Zealand. She also chaired an Inquiry for the Minister of Social Welfare into the Social Science Research Fund Committee and social sciences generally in 1986 to 1987. As a lawyer, Dame Silvia specialised in family law, and she has contributed significantly to both the substance and process of family law, in her practice and her writing, providing crucial support to the development of New Zealand's Family Court system. This support has been a feature, too, of her work as a Judge, which involved leading almost 100 District Court Judges in New Zealand, sitting as a Judge herself, co-ordinating judicial projects, and facilitating judicial education.

In all these roles, Dame Silvia has forged both a national and an international reputation, as a person whose judicial skills embody excellence in communication, dispute resolution, weighing of evidence and fair decision-making. She has transformed situations of bitterness into situations of open institutional and personal learning, with an unstinting devotion to people, to the value and worth of each human being.

Dame Silvia's skills and attributes have been drawn into the service of the community in numerous ways, in the national arena most importantly though her contribution from 1975 to 1981 as a member of the Commission for the Future, and in the international arena through her appointment in 1992 to the committee to monitor the Convention to End All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW), a human rights convention signed and ratified by 116 countries.

During the decade in which she lived in the University of Waikato catchment area, Dame Silvia contributed markedly to the welfare of its communities. She chaired the Waikato Marriage Guidance Council through the 1970s, was Charter President of the Hamilton - Waikato Zonta Club in 1974, and was involved with the Federation of University Women. She has, through her example and encouragement, been a model for many women entering lives of public service and lawyering.

Finally, Mr Chancellor, Dame Silvia has been a good friend of this University's Law School since its inception. You and many others here today will, I am sure, remember her generous words in May 1991 at the formal opening of the School, when she looked forward to a new beginning and a dawning of opportunity for legal education as the new School began its work.

The award of an Honorary Doctorate to Dame Silvia Cartwright is an auspicious recognition of the achievement and promise of women in law and public life in New Zealand on the occasion of the graduation of the first cohort from the School of Law. I am, therefore, honoured to present to you

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES

GRADUANDS TO DOCTORAL DEGREES

ROBERT HENDERSON BARBOUR

Admitted to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy (in Geography)

Robert Barbour began his doctoral research while teaching in a secondary school. He was intrigued to find from conversations with students that some had a thorough grasp of basic geographical ideas about their farming environment, but did not display similar competence in formal assessments. This led him to explore the strategies that students use in learning. Drawing on the work of Gordon Pask, he wondered if the differences in student performance were due to fundamental differences in the way they learnt. Further, if the style of materials used in teaching mismatched their strategy, it could account for poor performance. Conversely, if learning materials were matched to a student's learning strategy, their performance could be enhanced. These notions were explored in class-room experiments using a computer environment. The research involved innovative programmes for capturing the interaction between student learning and learning materials, and for matching learning strategies with appropriate teaching strategies.

ANGELA LAMBERTA MARIA CAVAYE

Admitted to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy (in Management Systems)

Angela Cavaye, now at the Department of Informatics and Management Accounting, Copenhagen Business School, has a strong interest in the strategic application of information technology in organisations. Her thesis investigated the relationships among factors that contribute to adoption of systems that use information technology to directly link organisations with their customers. A case research approach was used to collect data from New Zealand firms. Factors that influenced adoption and success were studied and incorporated into a causal model. The causal model suggests that the relationship between adoption factors and success is considerably more complicated than the linear model implied by previous research in other countries. As many systems are novel, and many potential users have limited experience with technology, typically these systems must be marketed carefully.

HOWARD BAXTER DAVEY

Admitted to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy (in Accounting & Finance)

Howard Davey has a background in both government and accounting practice before joining first Massey University and then the University of Waikato. He has continued to act as consultant in these areas during his academic career. He holds bachelors degrees in both accounting and economics and has an MBA. His research interests include capital budgeting and taxation, but the focus for his doctoral work was on accounting theory and theory derivation, tracing the developments in accounting from scientific to postmodernist thinking.

STEVEN ALAN FOULDS

Admitted to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy (in Philosophy)

Steven Foulds came to philosophy as a mature student, having previously been a watchmaker amongst other things. He received his Bachelors and Masters degrees from Massey University. His doctoral thesis concerns philosophical issues in self-deception. He considers a broad range of literature including much which focuses on the epistemic paradox of self-deception: the self-deceiver appears to believe what she or he knows to be false. Steven's account of the notion of self-deception, which takes the phenomenon as real rather than explaining it away, emphasises the process of coming to be self-deceived rather than the end state of self-deception.

ROCKY CLEOPATRA HUDSON

Admitted to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy (in Biological Sciences)

Rocky Hudson began research work on extreme thermophiles with the study of a hemicellulase enzyme. After completing her MSc (First Class) in one year rather than the usual two, she continued work on thermophiles, this time on the glutamate dehydrogenase from a primitive thermophilic archaebacterium. This complex enzyme connects nitrogen and carbon metabolism, and her results have suggested links between this organism and some salt-tolerant bacteria. As well as carrying out the first detailed kinetic analysis on any microbial glutamate dehydrogenase, and uncovering some new enzyme-metal interactions, her review of glutamate dehydrogenase published recently has already attracted much interest. Both her MSc and PhD results have given rise to other research projects, in many cases utilising the techniques she developed.

KAY MORRIS MATTHEWS

Admitted to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy (in Education)

Kay Matthews researched the history of women's studies as an academic subject in New Zealand universities from 1975 to 1990. She interviewed key informants in six universities - the women who initiated and taught the programmes and the men in senior positions who offered support. The research also involved painstaking reading of relevant institutional documents, such a agendas and minutes of meetings. A sociological framework was used as a basis for comparison of developments across the various institutions. The study was contextualised in a wider analysis of the history of women's higher education and structural changes in university administration. This thesis is possibly the first feminist doctoral thesis which has its roots in the discipline of History of Education.

STUART FLETCHER MURRAY

Admitted to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy (in English)

Stuart Murray came to Waikato with an Honours degree from the University of Exeter, where work in American and Post-Colonial literatures had made him curious about nationalism as a literary phenomenon. It has been an orthodoxy in this country that the 1930s saw the beginnings of New Zealand's independence from the English tradition with the growth of a spirit of literary nationalism. Dr Murray's close study of the major writers in this decade has resulted in a thesis that is a substantial revision of this view. He demonstrates that New Zealand writing in the 1930s was deeply influenced by English socialist literature and the tradition of male hegemony, and emphasises that the nationalist orthodoxy in this country has obscured the real diversity of our literature by marginalising women's writing in that period. The chapters on John Mulgan and Robin Hyde in particular represent new directions in New Zealand criticism. New Zealand literature is now part of the curriculum Dr Murray teaches as a lecturer at Trinity College in the University of Dublin.

SUSAN GEORGINA ARTEMISA RODRIGUES

Admitted to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy (in Science Education)

Susan is a qualified and experienced teacher who undertook research into the role that context has in students' learning in science. Working with Form 6 female chemistry students, she investigated the teaching and learning of redox reactions in contexts that were relevant and meaningful to students, for example, breathalysers and hairperming. The results indicated that learning redox reactions in these contexts motivated the students, increased the students' confidence, demonstrated to students how chemistry is relevant to society and themselves, encouraged the students to discuss ideas about redox reactions and ask questions of each other and the teacher, and resulted in a better understanding and recall of redox reactions. Her research is a valuable contribution to science education at a time when a new science curriculum, which promotes the notion of learning science in meaningful contexts, is being introduced into schools.

XIAOYING WU

Admitted to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy (in Demography & Economics)

Xiaoying (Harry) was born in the Peoples Republic of China. After ten years in the countryside during the cultural revolution, he attended Nankai University in Tianjin, where he graduated with a Masters degree in Economics. He subsequently worked under Professor Li Jing-Neng at Nankai's Institute of Population Research, one of the leading units dealing with economic-demographic research in China. He was also involved with policy oriented research relating to economic reforms. His thesis covered a critical issue in Chinese economic demography and one with major policy implications. He investigated the three-way relationships between industrial labour force transformation, urbanisation, and macro level policies. His conclusions relate to severe contradictions between actual demographic and economic trends, and major policy initiatives, such as the heavy manufacturing industrialisation programme of the earlier post-war period.
