HAMILTON - KIRIKIROA

The University of Waikato main campus is located in Hamilton, a young and multicultural city, rich in Māori history. Hamilton has a population of almost 170,000 people, and is home to the Kīngitanga - the Māori King movement. Located on the banks of the Waikato River, Hamilton boasts magnificent parks and gardens, cool street art and a vibrant café culture and nightlife.



TAURANGA

The Bay of Plenty region lives up to its name and offers an enviable coastal lifestyle, while still being central to Auckland and Hamilton. Tauranga is the fifth largest and fastest growing city in New Zealand and home to an estimated 145,000 people.

Located in the heart of Tauranga city, the CBD campus is part of an ever-growing educational precinct including state-of-the-art science and engineering labs, a marine science research centre, a new aquaculture research facility, and a high performance sports facility.

UNIVERSITY ON A HUMAN SCALE

Waikato is known as one of the friendliest universities in New Zealand. It is important to us that each student has an enjoyable, safe and supportive university experience and feels welcome in our community.

STUDENTS LEARN FROM THE BEST

Our teaching staff are knowledgeable, experienced and internationally-connected - many leaders in their field. Our academics are known for their collaborative, ground-breaking research, and mentoring of students. Waikato University provided New Zealand's first connection to the Internet in 1989 and has continued to lead with innovation in a variety of areas, from engineering, robotics and AI, to psychology and environmental science.

FLEXIBLE DEGREE STRUCTURES

Flexible degree structures mean students can choose a qualification that combines interests with career goals. If you wish, you can do a double major or a conjoint degree. A double major is where you study one degree but focus on two different subjects in depth within that degree. A conjoint degree is best suited to those wanting to study two very distinct fields, e.g. Science and Management.

FREE REGIONAL BUS SERVICE

We offer a free daily bus service for students living in the greater Waikato region. Additionally, there is a free bus service for students from Whakatāne, Rotorua and Katikati to our Tauranga campus.

AN EXCITING UNIVERSITY EXPERIENCE

From the moment you step onto our Hamilton and Tauranga campuses, you feel a sense of belonging. Our picturesque campuses have everything students need during their studies - a library, lecture theatres, student support services, cafés, banks, a gym and swimming pools are located on campus or close to it.

WHAT TO EXPECT

The first trimester is an exciting time, full of change from secondary school. Being prepared is key for new students to be able to cope with the experiences and challenges of university study.

A DIFFERENT LEARNING STYLE

When you arrive at University, you'll notice some things are slightly different than at high school.

	HIGH SCHOOL	UNIVERSITY

University students have approximately 15 hours of lectures per week, in addition to tutorials, course readings, research, lab/studio work, writing and revision. Attendance in class is not compulsory, but a roll call may be taken. In some programmes of study, participation in group discussion is mandatory and can count towards overall grades. Each student is expected to take responsibility for managing their own study and must approach teaching staff if they have questions.



BUILD NETWORKS

Around 13,000 people study at the University of Waikato across our Hamilton and Tauranga campuses. Opportunities to connect with other students, staff, researchers, industry professionals and members of the wider community can open up career prospects.

WORK INTEGRATED LEARNING

Our work-integrated learning (WIL) papers create a link between academic learning and the practical applications of this learning in the workplace. WIL is a compulsory component of all University of Waikato undergraduate degrees, and we are the only university in New Zealand who does this to ensure we have work-ready graduates.

Students will acquire, understand and apply essential professional skills that will prepare them for the future workforce, while allowing them to demonstrate their graduate knowledge to employers.

SHIFTING RELATIONSHIPS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

With new-found independence at university, your child will begin to make their own decisions. They will become responsible for their own time, money and wellbeing. This is the time for young adults to learn to be self-motivated and organised.

STUDENT LIFE AT WAIKATO

At both our Hamilton and Tauranga campuses, the atmosphere is friendly and inclusive. The first few weeks at university will be dedicated to attending introductory lectures, navigating the grounds, making friends and learning about the support services available.

ACCESS AVAILABLE RESOURCES

MyWaikato is a fantastic mobile-friendly system designed to support students during their entire University journey from application right through to graduation. MyWaikato can be used to make enquiries, enrol, pay fees, view timetables and access final grades.



THE UNIVERSITY YEAR

February

Orientation Week has plenty on offer for our new and returning students. Live music, food stalls, competitions and more will take place on the Village Green. Our Academic Orientation programme is specifically designed for new students to help them settle into university study. Essential presentations and workshops will be made available online to view throughout the year.

March

Trimester A and full-year classes start. This is where students discover what their workload will be like for the year and can reach out to our support services on campus for help if needed.

April

Trimester A mid-trimester break commences. This is a busy time working on assignments. A lot of students opt to go home for the break.

May

Trimester A resumes and students will start preparing for final assignments and end of trimester exams.

June

Trimester A exams happen after a one week study break. Once exams have finished there will be a two week break before Trimester B begins.

July

Trimester A ends. Trimester B begins near the end of the month. This is where new papers start up and students are now used to the way the university works.

August

Trimester B mid-trimester break commences.

September

Trimester B resumes and students are getting ready for their end of year exams.

October

Trimester B exams happen after a one week study break.

November

Trimester B exams are over and your child has completed their first university year!

MĀORI KI WAIKATO



Tēnā koutou katoa. Nau mai haere mai ki te whānau o Te Whare Wānanga o Waikato.

The University of Waikato is proud to be part of an intergenerational legacy amongst whānau and communities throughout Aotearoa. Our Māori students make up nearly a quarter of our student population and are visible and active members of our University community. Our programmes are designed to prepare taira Māori to contribute to the next generation of Māori excellence here in Aotearoa and across the globe.

Whakawhanaungatanga and relationships are important parts of university life, particularly for those leaving their whānau and rohe. Through Te Puna Tautoko, we provide opportunities for taira Māori to build new connections with staff and taira across the University. Our programmes extend through to doctoral studies but for new students we highly recommend the following:

Te Kāhui Pīrere is open to all taira Māori in their first-year and helps them to settle in, find friends and learn about the different services on campus.

Te Pūoho connects a series of Māori student hubs throughout the faculty, divisions and Tauranga Moana campus which focus on building Māori student community, inspiring Māori student excellence, connecting taira to relevant services and empowering them with the tools they need at university.

We also have a number of rōpū Māori to help guide taira Māori through their studies.

- Te Waiora – largest Māori student group on campus
- Te Ranga Ngāku – Management
- Te Whakahiapō – Law
- Tūmata Kōkiri – Education, and Health, Sport and Human Performance
- Te Kāuru - Māori and Indigenous Studies
- STEM Māori and Pacifica - Health, Engineering, Computing and Science
- Te Tini o Hakuturi - Environmental Planning

Our experience with taira Māori tells us that not all taira have similar access to information about university so we recommend talking to your tamaiti early about the possibility of university study. Although our taira come from different backgrounds we believe each of them has the potential and opportunity to excel.

PACIFIC AT WAIKATO

PACIFIC ORIENTATION: BEGINNING THE VOYAGE

Once your child is here, our dedicated Pacific student support staff will ensure they are welcomed into a culturally safe space and inform them of the support we offer. There is always help available when your child needs it - they just have to ask. We run student learning seminars, workshops and drop-ins for academic help. You can also book one-on-one appointments with staff.

IMUA LEARNER LEADER INITIATIVE

The Imua Initiative is a year long leadership and academic programme designed to help first-year students successfully transition into tertiary study and to continue progressing through key stages of the university journey.

PACIFIC STUDENT SUPPORT

We are committed to enhancing the success of Pacific students who choose to study at Waikato. Pacific student support includes academic seminars, workshops, drop-in sessions, peer mentoring and study groups. Pacific support staff are available to help and on-campus cultural and faculty-specific groups represent and celebrate the vibrant cultures of the Pacific.

THE CONCH – OUR PACIFIC SPACE

The Conch is a dedicated space on campus for Pacific students to meet, study, refuel and be cultural. The space is located on Level Zero of the Student Centre in Hamilton and is open from 9am – 5pm weekdays.

ACCOMMODATION

HAMILTON

At The University of Waikato, we have some of the cheapest university student accommodation in New Zealand. Our affordable on-campus Halls of Residence are the ideal place for first year students to settle into university life. We have Bryant Hall, College Hall and Student Village.

The beginning of every year in the halls kicks off with a full orientation for new residents. All rooms are fully furnished, have free WiFi, are fully carpeted and centrally heated. In Bryant Hall we have a Kaupapa Māori floor, Nga Tokoroaa-Taingahue and a floor for Pacific students.



TAURANGA

Located across the road from our CBD campus, Selwyn Street Studios offers self-catered living in a brand new, University-managed complex. The 88 standard and three accessibility studio rooms are fully furnished, have free WiFi and come complete with en suite bathrooms and mini fridges.

Each floor has shared social spaces that provide stunning views across the harbour. Communal areas are located on the basement level and an attractive outdoor area is a great place to relax and enjoy the great weather that Tauranga is famous for.



There is one Residential Leader (RL) to every 30 students to provide help and guidance. Fully catered halls have a dining room where breakfast, lunch and dinner is served (21 meals a week).

The University of Waikato endeavors to have one alcohol-free floor per hall to accommodate our under 18 year old students and students who state on their application form that they would like to be on an alcohol-free floor. This is subject to sufficient numbers requesting it.

Our Residential Leaders who live in the halls are students too, so they are likely to know the kinds of issues other students may have and can help them figure them out. Staff are rostered on duty every day, including evenings and weekends, so there is always someone around to help.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Our scholarships reward academic ability, leadership potential, community spirit, sporting skills, creative and performing arts talent.

We appreciate the diversity of our student group and provide funding for students from all backgrounds. Scholarships may offer support for fees or accommodation, or may be paid directly to the student.

Sir Edmund Hillary Scholarship

FEES AND COSTS

FEES-FREE POLICY

The Government's fees-free policy covers one year's full-time study (120 points, which can take more than a year if you study part-time), and is for all students who are new to tertiary education. Almost all University of Waikato courses are covered under this policy.

ELIGIBILITY

Students are eligible for fees-free study if they:

- Are a New Zealand citizen, or meet New Zealand residency requirements
- Are not enrolled in secondary school when your qualification starts
- Have not undertaken previous study or training of more than 60 credits, except while you were at school
- Enrol in an eligible qualification (all University of Waikato bachelor's degrees are eligible).

STUDENT LOANS AND ALLOWANCES

Domestic students can apply for Student Loans and Student Allowances through Studylink. Applications for Student Loans and Student Allowances should be submitted at least two months before starting studying. This will allow plenty of time for the application to be processed, to ensure that payments are made on time.

FINANCIAL PLANNING

Students are often faced with new expenses during their first year of study.

Student Job Search is a job placement service for tertiary education students looking for work to boost their finances. This free service is run by students and matches more than 27,000 students with employers every year.

WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN A STUDENT LOAN AND STUDENT ALLOWANCE?

Student Loan

A Student Loan is to pay for course fees, study materials and living costs. This needs to be paid back once the student has finished studying.

Student Allowance

A Student Allowance is a weekly payment to assist with living expenses whilst studying. This does not need to be paid back. Eligibility is based on parents' combined income. To find out more, head to studylink.govt.nz.

TIPS FOR PARENTS

Prepare your child to be financially responsible so they understand the stresses and strains of living on a limited budget. Have a conversation with your child before they leave for university about what costs they will have and how they will pay for them.

Support your child to do the very best they can in their studies. Keep in touch and be available to talk in case they need advice or guidance.

Encourage your child to balance studies with extracurricular activities. Students can join a club, get involved in cultural groups and attend social or academic events.

Motivate your child to look after their health while at university. As a parent, whānau member or caregiver, you can encourage your child to adopt good physical activity habits and make healthy food choices.

Familiarise yourself with the resources available at university to support your child. If a problem arises you can then recommend the appropriate services to your child and encourage them to get help. Your child will appreciate the support you give them.

ENROL IN 5 EASY STEPS

TAKE 2 MINUTES TO CREATE A MYWAIKATO ACCOUNT

To get started, go to enrol.waikato.ac.nz and select 'Create an account'. Ensure that the email address you enter in your **MyWaikato** account is one that you will use when you start university, as most communications sent from the Admissions Office are done by email.

2

LOG IN AND APPLY FOR YOUR COURSE

You'll need to know which qualification you want to study, which subject you want to focus on (your major subject) and which trimester you want to begin study. We may ask you for more information. Some programmes have an additional selection process and/or interview. We aim to respond to applications within one week, however this may take longer during peak periods.

3

RESPOND TO OFFER OF PLACE

You will be sent an **Offer of Place** by email if your application is approved. Log into **MyWaikato** to accept your Offer of Place to let us know you have decided to study your qualification at the University of Waikato.

4

CHOOSE YOUR PAPERS AND COMPLETE YOUR ENROLMENT

Once enrolment is open (usually the last three months of the previous year), you can choose your papers by logging into **MyWaikato**. We will contact you at this stage to assist with paper selection and finalising your enrolment.

5

ACCEPT YOUR ENROLMENT AGREEMENT

Once you receive your Enrolment Agreement by email, you will need to accept it and let us know how you will pay your tuition fees. Search for your qualification online at waikato.ac.nz/study/course-finder to find the most up-to-date fees information.
