2022 Survey Results



Introduction

The University of Waikato launched its seventh Graduate Destination Survey (GDS) in August 2023 and 2617 graduates who **completed their qualifications between January 2022 and December 2022** were invited to participate in the GDS survey. An overall response rate of 20% was achieved, down from 23% in 2021. This survey is designed to gather insights, feedback, and current employment data from University of Waikato Graduates.



Qualification & University Experience

Most respondents felt strongly that the quality of their education at the University of Waikato was of a high standard with 88% of respondents agreeing or strongly agreeing. 82% of respondents would recommend study at UoW to others.

Employment

The employment rate remained high with 95% of respondents indicating that they were working in either full- or part-time employment. 71% of respondents felt that their university study prepared them for the workforce.



Further Study

Among the 2023 respondents 12% were undertaking further study the time of the survey with 55 of respondents currently enrolled in a postgraduate qualification. Furthermore, 69% of the respondents who continued to study have reenrolled with the University of Waikato.



Work Integrated Learning/Internships

65% of Graduates undertook either an internship, placement, work integrated learning paper and/or an applied research project while studying at the University of Waikato. 74% of respondents were satisfied that the learning placement prepared them for their chosen industry with 1% being extremely dissatisfied, down from 5% in 2022.

Student Services

Graduates were asked how satisfied they were with the non-academic/non-teaching support services available to them on campus during their studies with 32% of respondents with 72% being very satisfied, up from 66% in 2021.



Doctoral Feeback

Since 2021, the GDS was expanded to include our doctoral graduates with questions specifically designed to understand this cohort.

Within eighteen months of completing their PhD, 80% of respondents were working in full-time employment.
